Assignment: Read *The Time Machine* by H.G. Wells. Imagine that you can travel into the future. Create five video interviews with people from the future. Select an array of people to interview. You could choose to interview yourself, family members, friends from your class, pop culture figures, or politicians. Be creative with costumes, props, and filming locations. Your interviews should contain 10-20 questions each. Be prepared to share your videos during the first week of class. You should also be prepared for a test on the book during the first week.

In addition to *The Time Machine* you must also select a book from the list below to read. Once you have read your book select three high interest scenes to share with the class. You should complete a brief write up of each scene or event from the story explaining what happened and why you selected this particular passage. Make sure that your write ups are neatly written or typed.

The Daughter of Time Josephine Tey (If you are going to read this book I would recommend first reading about Richard III so that you have adequate background information.)

Murder on the Orient Express Agatha Christie

You may also read any of the books from the Harry Potter series provided that you have not previously read the book you select. If you choose to read a book from this series you must have a parent email me stating that you have not read that particular book.

Assignment:

Part I

As you are reading *The Lord of the Rings* (LOTR) note all the places that Frodo stops on his journey. This should be in a list format. You should have one descriptive quote from the book for each place. Using these notes construct a map of Frodo's journey. You may incorporate the quotes into your map or have a separate key for the quotes. Be creative! You will be graded not only on content but also on presentation. Maps will be turned in on the first day of school.

Part II

Prepare for Bilbo Baggins Birthday Extravaganza! This section is **not due until we finish the 3rd book in class, usually in early October**. It is easier to assemble your costume over the summer. You DO NOT need to spend money. Be creative with household items!

- 1. Choose a character from LOTR.
- 2. Assemble a costume that represents the character's appearance in the books.
- 3. Write a short speech or poem introducing your character.
- 4. Choose a food item from LOTR that you can approximate and bring to Bilbo's party.

Students will read *The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King*, the final book in this trilogy, together as a class during the first weeks of school. We will hold our party after completion of the final book in the trilogy. Then, students will be tested on all three books.
