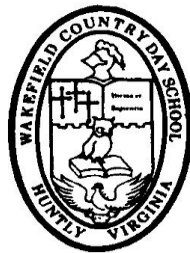

THE SCHOOL

Wakefield Country Day School (WCDS) is a pre-school through twelfth grade college preparatory school whose curriculum emphasizes scholarship in the classical tradition. Situated about ninety minutes outside of Washington, D.C., on a twelve-acre rural campus in Rappahannock County, Virginia, the school draws students from and provides bus transportation to its surrounding eight counties. International students also attend WCDS at the high school level and live with host families or on campus at Trinity Manor with a faculty member's family.

WCDS prides itself on offering an education designed to produce students who write well, possess strong analytical skills, and demonstrate well-developed ethical responsibility. The school lives up to its motto of *Virtus et Sapientia*, (Virtue and Wisdom) by fostering an ethic of individual worth, service, and personal responsibility in order to prepare its graduates for the moral and intellectual rigors of citizenship in the twenty-first century. ***Its mission is to develop each student's character and intellect through active involvement in a structured curriculum founded on classical principles and in an environment that encourages scholarship, diligence, self-discipline, and respect for and service to others.***

WCDS is accredited by the Virginia Independent School Association whose accreditation process has been approved by the Virginia Council for Private Education Committee on Accreditation as authorized by the Virginia State Board of Education.

THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

All Upper School students take a demanding, honors level course load, and student electives can be tailored to fulfill the requirements of the diploma offered. The WCDS Classical Diploma requires completion of 32 credits: Possible areas of concentration include mathematics, history, language, and science. All exceed Virginia’s mandate of 23 credits for graduation. Each of these courses of study requires completion of at least:

WCDS also offers an International Studies Diploma (23 credits) which is designed to meet the needs of those in the international boarding community who enter WCDS after the tenth grade.

The school day at WCDS consists of eight, 45-minute class periods held Monday through Friday. Most students take seven or eight academic courses per day. Semester grades reflect two-quarter grades, plus the semester exam. Because of its size, WCDS does not rank its students but does compute cumulative academic grade point averages at the end of each year for grades 9 -12.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT OFFERINGS

Depending on the year, WCDS offers Advanced Placement Courses in Calculus AB and BC, English Language, English Literature, Environmental Science, Modern European History, Latin, Spanish, Statistics, Comparative Government, and U.S. Government. Two classes (Spanish and Environmental Science) are offered as Dual Enrollment for college credit through Laurel Ridge Community College. Additional on-line AP courses are an option for students as well. Consistently WCDS seniors receive recognition as AP Scholars.
